INTRODUCTION

IPFG is a non-governmental organization created in 2002 and legally registered by the ministerial Order N^0 17/11 of 31 January 2006 which was published in the Official Gazette of the Republic of Rwanda O.G N^0 10 bis of 15 May 2006.

Vision: IPFG aspires to a democratic society where both women and men are aware of their problems, complement one another and actively participate in the actions of the entire development

Mission: To promote and reinforce complementarity between man and woman as well as their participation in the actions which aim to achieve social and economic development based on fairness.

It is based in southern province, Nyamagabe District, Gasaka Sector and operates in 3 Districts namely Nyamagabe, Nyaruguru and Nyamasheke. Its priorities over 5 years include improving the livelihoods of the target beneficiaries; promoting gender, fighting against GBV and conflict resolution in the families; promoting citizens' participation at local level and strengthening its institutional capacity. IPFG has been supporting poor and vulnerable people where it has been contributing to SDG: 1(no poverty); 2 (No hunger); 5 (gender equality); 13 (climate action); and 15 (life on land).

Concerning networking, IPFG is one of founder members of IPC, "Initiative pour la Participation Citoyenne" a network of 5 local NGOs⁴ strengthening citizens' participation through imihigo cycle. It is also a member of RCCDN, Rwanda Climate Change and Development Network, that strengthens the implementation of nationally determined contributions (NDCs) and other amendments with regard to climate change to which Rwanda is signatory. In addition to that, it is a member of CCOAIB⁵.


IPFG has a strong governance structure general assembly; board of Directors; control committee; procurement committee, conflict resolution committee and technical team. The board of





- 45% of processing plant raw material were supplied by farmers' cooperatives
- Community seed bank constructed in Ngoma sector/Nyaruguru District to promote collective collection of the farmers' harvests and sell collectively.

Other achievements

- ✓ Improved milling machine was purchased;
- ✓ Implementation of the food safety management system (FSMS);
- ✓ Purchase of Quality control and testing equipment like moisture meter;
- ✓ Purchase of improved packaging materials for processed flours;
- ✓ The new company now known as Komezubuzima Ltd was registered in RDB whereby the certificate of registration was obtained in June, 2014;
- ✓ S-mark from RSB (Rwanda standard Board) was awarded for 2products (Komezubuzima composite flour and Roasted soybean flour) among 11processed products;
- ✓ IPFG influenced local authorities of Nyamagabe District especially in Cyanika Sector to consider soybean crop in sector performance contract 2014/2015 as a productive and nutritional crop.




The above achievements were realized with the financial support from Comic Relief and IRISH AID via Trócaire-Rwanda.

Small livestock distribution (Chickens; Goats and Pigs) to poor and vulnerable households.

1,292 Small livestock were distributed to the targeted households. The chart below summarizes the type of livestock distributed.

Climate change adaptation and mitigation to build resilient communities.

- 10Communities (Villages) educated in climate change effects and adaptation and mitigation measures.
- To Community Action Plans, baseline and vision maps developed and IPFG has been supporting some actions in those action plans.
- Holistic landscape planning is also being strengthened.





10 Water Committees comprised of 80members of which 50% are females established at village level and supported (trainings; materials).



After evaluation of their work, water committee members were awarded with different materials (Boots, certificates, t-shirts, registers and wallets). Individual farmers were also evaluated and the 2 best performers were awarded certificates and pigs.

Agro-forestry planting promotion in intervention area.

8 Nurseries developed (7in Gitega and 1 in kiyumba cell) with more than 80,000 agro-forestry trees including fruit trees. Agro-forestry planting was promoted in the intervention area.



Provision of roof rain water harvesting technologies to poor and vulnerable households.

- > 749 Households were support to have Rain Water Harvesting and storage tanks to strengthen agricultural production particularly vegetables.
- ➤ 12 Very old houses were rehabilitated before installation of water tanks (8Houses in Gitega and 4 in Kiyumba cells respectively).



Now KANKINDI living in Gikomero village, Kiyumba cell, Cyanika sector is no longer hopeless of life as she worried that her very old house should destroy her life.

The financial support from SCIAF and IRISH AID via Trócaire is much appreciated.



These water tanks contributed not only to increase of vegetable production in the intervention area but also to improved social cohesion and house hold income from the harvests.

Strengthening of vegetable production



The targeted households were provided with enough vegetable seeds (carrots; onion; beetroots; pepper and cabbages) strengthen vegetable production; contribute improved nutrition and increased income from the harvests. This has been contributing to obtaining basic household needs.

Photo Cyanika/Kiyumba: Artificial land use was adopted by the targeted beneficiaries



The targeted population, motivated by rain water harvesting for vegetable production, even in dry season, they are growing vegetables.

Saving and loan groups creation and support

- 8 Saving and loan Groups created and supported including 5 in Gitega and 3 in Kiyumba.
- Off farm Job strengthened through (1) provision of loan capital to saving and loan groups and (2) provision of financial support to individual beneficiaries (17persons) particularly females.

Promoting use of energy efficient cooking stoves in intervention areas.



496 poor households having kitchens provided with saving cooking stoves of DARFULL type.



76 poor households whose no kitchens were provided with mobile saving cooking stoves

In total 576 HHs supported to have energy efficient cooking stoves "cana rumwe"

Key achievements with support from International Alert and EU

- Farmers increased skills on how to calculate agriculture production cost
- Strengthening Gender mainstreaming in Agriculture sector.
- Sharing findings from CRC 2017 with District's stakeholders (Focus on agriculture and livestock production).
- Agricultural committees VAC, CAC, SAC & DAC were supported to understand and fulfil their roles and responsibilities.

- > Training Agricultural committees and CSOs on PSTA4, roles and responsibilities in implementation of PSTA4.
- Facilitate planning between VAC, CAC, SAC, and DAC where DAC and 2 SAC action plans were elaborated and implemented.
- Food security vulnerability and risks mapping and analysis conducted by VAC and FAG members Across 17 sectors after being trained in this exercise.
- ToT at District level conducted to enable replication of this exercise
- Results of mapping exercise presented to the stakeholders including small scale farmers, VAC, CACA, SAC, DAC and CSOs representatives. Events held at cell level.
- Finally, community food security action plans were elaborated across 34 targeted villages.

 In addition, baseline and vision maps were elaborated.

Under pillar 2. Gender promotion, GBV prevention, and conflict resolution & youth empowerment

Youth and single mothers' empowerment

On funds from EDC Akazi kanoze,

➤ 298youth from Gasaka, Cyanika, kamegeli, Kibilizi and Kitabi sectors including 153 males and 145 females were trained in work readiness curriculum (Akazi kanoze). They graduated and awarded certificate recognized by WDA⁶



239 youth including 124 males and

115 females were provided with entrepreneurial skills

On funds from UNDP via RGB,



One of the youth supported to initiate small income generating business in Gasaka sector.

In total 358 youth including 179 females and 179 males were socio-economically empowered.

60 youth including 34 females and 26males were supported to increase skills in (1) reproductive health and transmissible diseases; (2) entrepreneurial skills; (3) Internship in four trades including masonry; hairdressing; welding and carpentry and (4) provision of start-up kits to initiate small income generating businesses.

Enhancing the citizens' participation in imihigo cycle.



- > Supporting districts of intervention in imihigo cycle processes(Planning: collection of citizens' priorities); implementation, monitoring and evaluation
- Training of opinion leaders at sector level across 46 sectors composing nyamagabe, nyaruguru and nyamsheke districts;

- Training of quality assurance team at sector level across Nyamagabe, Nyaruguru and Nyamasheke districts.
- Mid-term and annual imihigo evaluation in 3 Districts of intervention.

Capacity building through trainings (Visualization; planning and budgeting; advocacy, etc.)

Through IPC on funds from GIZ, there was trainings on Visualization; planning and budgeting; advocacy for staff from organization members of IPC. This contributed to improving the work regarding data presentation, etc.

Enhancing imihigo dissemination, transparency and accountability through Dash Boards & initiation of imihigo watch.



Dash board were installed across 46 sectors in Nyamagabe; Nyaruguru and Nyamasheke districts;

In collaboration with GIZ, IPC is in process of initiating Imihigo watch App.

Provision of small grants to strengthen re-opening/re-dynamization of small income generating activities (IGAs).

Through IPC, 1,373 small traders including 1,147 females and 226 males were technically and financially supported to re-open/re-dynamize their small income generating businesses in Nyamagabe, Nyaruguru and Nyamasheke Districts in 11 sectors including Gasaka, Tare, Mushubi and Kaduha in Nyamagabe; Ngoma, Busanze and Kibeho in Nyaruguru; Kanjongo, Kagano, Ruharambuga and Nyabitekeri in Nyamasheke. Over 67,950,700RWF were provided to those targeted beneficiairies.



Supporting more affected people to cope with Covid – 19 effects in Nyamagabe District.

In Cyanika Sector:

IPFG in collaboration with Trócaire **238HHs** composed of **894**persons were supported with food and hygienic materials. Each HH was provided with **20**Kgs of maize flour; **15**kgs of beans; **5**bars of soap; **2**buckets; 2cotexes; 1jerican.

In total **4,760Kgs** of maize flour; **3,570Kgs** of beans; **1,190bars of soap**; **476** buckets; **238**jericans; **476**cotexes were provided and **6**megaphones (1megaphone per each of the 6 cells composing Cyanika sector); **200**masks; **2**leg push and wash commonly known as "**kandagira ukarabe**" were also provided.

TROCAIRE IN PARTNERSHIP WITH IPFG ASSISTED PEOPLE THAT WERE IN SPECIAL LOCKDOWN IN NYAMAGABE DISTRICT, GASAKA AND KIBILIZI SECTORS.

Nyamagabe District is one of the Districts of Rwanda affected by Covid-19 effects whereby after 4/5/2020 when Lockdown was a bit relaxed, on 14/7/2020 the minister of local government published a letter confirming special lockdown particularly for people living in Kigeme Cell of Gasaka Sector and Ruhunga Cell of Kibilizi sector due to the cases of corona virus to protect this population.

This lead to different consequences including people who were staying at their homes and not

allowed to work. This caused hunger in the affected population, and might be cause of delay of

the beginning of the growing season A 2021 as people do not get time for preparing for seeds to

grow.

It is in this regards, TROCAIRE and IPFG intervened to support the district in handling these issues.

Thus, various items that make the support were provided to cell that were retained in lockdown,

and those are Ruhunga cell in Kibilizi sector, and Kigeme cell in Gasaka sector as stated above.

The support provided was composed of the following:

*Food items that include:

Beans: 3,000kgs

• Maize flour: 3,000kgs

Cooking oil: 600liters

*Seeds:

Maize seeds: 600kgs

• Beans seeds: 1,200kgs

Onion seeds: 7kgs

Carrots: 6kgs

Hygienic and sanitation materials:

• Soap: 1,200 pieces

• Jerikan: 300 pieces

• Buckets: 300 pieces

• Kandagira-ukarabe: 7 pieces




